Q1) What is a pronoun?

Ans. A pronoun is a word which is used instead of a noun.

Q2) What are personal pronouns?

Ans. Pronouns that are used to describe a particular person thing or group of things are called personal pronouns.

Q3) Define first person.

Ans. When we talk about ourselves, our opinions and the things that happen to us we generally speak in the first person.

Q4) Define second person.
