Q1. What is a participle?

Ans. A word that partakes of the nature of a verb and an adjective is known as participle.

Q2. What is present participle?

Ans. Participles ending in -ing describe incomplete actions, are called present participles.

Q3. What is a past participle?

Ans. Participles ending in -e, -en, -d and -t describes completed actions, are called past participles.
